Public Health.

The assurance given by Dr. McKee relative to the health of the city present and prospective is a source of much gratification to our people. He tells us that there is in his opinion, no danger of a fever epidemic, but, of course, this is predicted upon the supposition that proper sanitary regulations are promptly looked after. That this will be done, there is no room to doubt as our worthy Chief of Police, aided by his entire force are using every effort to ferret out and abate nuisances wherever they may be found to exist. We feel it is but an act of justice, that their efforts should be duly acknowledged and appreciated. It is a time of the year when to some extent, in all cities, sickness occurs, and we can hardly hope that Raleigh should entirely escape. At all events let us do our part in aiding the authorities to execute due and unceasing vigilance.

City Ordinance.

We have been requested to print the following section from an ordinance of the city, and to announce that its provisions will be rigidly enforced.

Section 10. "No bog sty shall be located within 25 feet of any public street within the city or within 25 feet of premises of others than the owner or within 25 feet of any well or spring or other water used for drinking or culinary purposes, or any natural drain or gutter within the city limits; and if such sty shall be located contrary to the meaning of this ordinance, and the persons offending fail to remove it within two days, on being notified to do so by the chief of police, he shall be fined five dollars."

Heretofore this ordinance has only been enforced when complaints were made, but we are informed by the chief of police that from now on he will rigidly enforce the above ordinance.
