Mr. Andrew Carnegie probably wishes that those eighty British news papers he owns were published in the United States. Then he might get a good word occasionally.

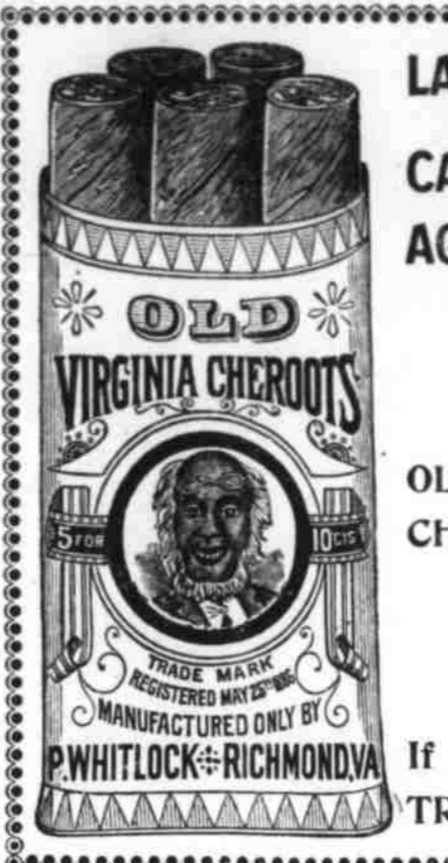
