This body met at Metropolitan Hall at noon, today for the purpose of nominating a legislative and county ticket, and other purposes.
The convention was called to order by W. C. Stronach, Esq., Chairman of the Wake County Ex Committee. The representatives of the Democratic Press were chosen secretaries. A committee on credentials was dispensed with as it was found that all the townships were represented, there being no contests.
Mr. R. H. Battle was elected permanent chairman, who being escorted to the chair, made an appropriate address.
Mr. W. W. Wilson was selected as Assistant Secretary.
Mr. M. W. Page was nominated for the office of sheriff by acclamation.
The nomination of a Register of Deeds was proceeded with.
The name of Millard Mial was presented. Messrs F. F. Williams, Willie G. Riddick and T. S. Lynn were also presented.
A ballot being taken Mr. Mial was declared to be the nominee.
Mr. Louis O. Lougee was nominated for Treasurer by acclamation.
Dr. Buffalo was nominated for Coroner by acclamation.
Mr. Jos. Blake was nominated for Surveyer by acclamation.
Mr. H. C. Olive was nominated for the Senate by acclamation.
The following gentlemen were nominated for the House of Representatives: Maj. C. H. Clark, Walter Grimes and F. L. Marriott.
The delegates to the Congressional Convention were instructed to vote for A. D. Jones as long as there appeared a reasonable chance for his nomination.

The bulletin issued by the Agricultural Bureau for the month ending August 1st, 1892, represents the weather throughout the State during the past week as usually warm and dry. The maximum temperature has been above 90 degrees. It has been one of the longest continued dry spells experienced in this State for a long time. Notwithstanding the crops seem to have improved. Corn and tobacco slightly injured. Threshing wheat and oats seems to be over. Making hay continues and, in some sections curing tobacco has commenced.
