## Horrible Murder.

A brutal murder took place last Tuesday afternoon at the house of Mr. P. R. Coble, a most estimable citizen residing near Pleasant Garden in Guilford county. It seems that Mr. Solathiel Swaim, the murdered man, had sold some property and had the proceeds, amounting to about \$700 on his person. He was stopping at the house of Mr. Coble, and on the evening stated he had fallen asleep in a chair on the porch. Mr. Coble was not at home and Mrs. Coble was about her household duties. She heard the report of a pistol, and going into the porch found Mr. Swaim had been shot in the head and was dying. Her screams brought some neighbors to the scene who found a straw hat lying in the yard and one rubber shoe. These were identified as belonging to a young white boy named Charles Reynolds, residing in the neighborhood. Upon enquiry it was found that he had borrowed a pistol a few days previous. He was arrested.
