Died

Mrs. Teresa Mottee died last Tuesday at her residence nine miles northwest of Raleigh at the age of 89. She leaves thirteen children, eighty nine grandchildren and seventy five great grandchildren.

The Guilford Murder.

There is great excitement in Greensboro over the recent murder of Mr. Solathiel Swain near Pleasant Garden last Tuesday. A young white man named Charles Reynolds and a negro named Marion Headen have been lodged in jail in Greensboro, charged with the crime. Charles Reynolds says the murder was committed by a negro named William Long, who had been driving an omnibus for the McAdoo House in Greensboro. He says he saw Long creep up near old man Swain, place the pistol near him and fire. Long then ran, gave him a handful of money and told him not to say anything about it. He told the sheriff he would find the money and pistol in a box in his house. He said that he was dividing the money with Headen and Long passed along the road.

Martin Headen, the colored man, says he was working in the woods with Reynolds. Saw Long pass. The sheriff has discovered the money and pistol where Reynolds says it was. He found \$120 in money.

Long has succeeded in proving an alibi, and the crime is undoubtedly fixed on Reynolds and Headen.

Destructive Fire.

One of the most disastrous fires that has occurred in this vicinity took place last night between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock, destroying the building known as the acid department of the Carolina Phosphate Mills, situated just southwest of the city. The building was about 250 feet long and 60 feet wide. The origin of the fire is not precisely known, but is supposed to have been caused from the ignition of a kerosene lamp. The entire building was consumed, including the machinery, the total loss being estimated from \$25,000 to \$40,000. Several members of the fire department went out to the scene, but of course could not carry their apparatus. They did good however, although it was impossible to save the house. There is on the grounds water works equipment which was used as far as practicable.

This is indeed a sad loss to our industries, but we are pleased to learn from Mr. Frank Dancey, the energetic President of the company, that the work of reconstruction will be commenced as early as possible.
