Long has succeeded in proving an alibi, and the crime is undoubtedly fixed on Reynolds and Headen.


Destructive Fire.

One of the most disastrons fires that has occurred in this vicinity took place last night between the hours of and 9 o'clock, destroying the bailding known as the acid department of the Caraleigh Phosphate Mills, situated just southwest of the city. The building was about 250 feet long and 60 feet wide. The origin of the fire is not precisely known, but is supposed to have been caused from the igni tion of a kerosene lamp. The entire building was corsumed, including the machinery, the total loss being esti mated from \$25 000 to \$40,000. Sev. eral members of the fire department went out to the scene, but of course could not carry their apparatus They did good hewever, although it was impossible to save the house. There is on the grounds water works equipment which was used as far as practicable. This is indeed a sad loss to our industries, but we are pleased to learn from Mr. Frank Dancey, the energetic President of the company, that the work of reconstruction will be commenced as early as possible.
