There are now about six thousand public schools in North Carolina. In 1878 there was not a public school in the State.

Dr. Thomas F. Wood, of Wilmington died yesterday aged 54. He was president of the North Carolina State Board of Health and editor of the N. C. Medical Journal.

The fall term of Trinity College will begin at Durham in the new buildings Sept. 1st, but the dedication has been postponed until Oct. 19th when Bishop Galloway is expected to preach the sermon.

There are now 231 licensed brandy distilleries in this district. This is a considerable falling off, as, in the past year, there were 530. There are now nearly a hundred registered liquor distilleries. Most of them make corn whiskey.

We saw at the store of Messrs. W. C. & A. B. Stronach this morning some of the finest watermelons both as to size and quality that have been here this season. Our attention was called by Mr. A. B. Stronach to a peculiarity which consisted of the thinness of the rind. By scraping the melon a little the red meat could be plainly seen.
