It will of course be very plain and rough in exterior but will be strong and equal to its demands, and only one story.

If we had such a building it could be used for all State Conventions, for skating rink, bicycling, &c. Popular concert troupes, with low price of admission would be induced to come this way.

## Associate Justice Appointed.

This morning Hon. J. C. MacRae of Cumberland was appointed by Gov. Holt to the position of a Justice of the Supreme Court, made vacant by the death of Justice J. J. Davis. The appointment is justly considered a most excellent one.

## Serious Accident.

We deeply regret to state that Dr. W. S. Black, Superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, and a former honored citizen of Raleigh, has met with a serious accident. The Oxford Day Book:

D. W. S. Black, Superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, was returning from Union prayer meeting at the Methodist church yesterday afternoon. He was in the Asylum back, and an orphan boy was driving.

When opposite the rectory on Co. Jeger's street a passing bicyclist frightened the horse, and he plunged and broke one of the reins. Then he came for the sidewalk, struck the fence in front of I. Kronheimer's residence and overturned the vehicle, throwing the occupants violently to the ground.

The accident was witnessed by a number of people and they ran quickly to render assistance. Dr. J. M. Hays and others lifted Dr. Black up and took him to the carriage of J. S. Hunt, which was fortunately nearby, and carried him home. An examination of his injuries showed that an ankle was sprained and that he was severely bruised about the face and body. It is feared he will not be able to leave his bed for some weeks. The little boy escaped unhurt.
