Work on the new switch of the Electric railway near St. Mary's has commenced.

A petition will be submitted to the next Legislature for a restoration of the charter of Fayetteville.

On next Monday, it is expected that the regular spinning of yarn will commence at Caraleigh Mills.

An application for admission to the Horner School at Oxford, has been made from South America.

The Neuse River Lumber Company of New Bern, has determined to increase its capital to \$50,000.

The opening of the Raleigh Male academy yesterday was a grand success. The attendance was larger than ever.

Bear in mind the lawn party to be given next Monday evening in Nash Square in aid of the confederate monument fund.

H. B. Battle State Chemist, will select from sixteen points in North Carolina, specimens of soil for exhibition at Chicago.

The funeral services of the late Mrs. Seth A. Jones took place from the Baptist Tabernacle yesterday afternoon. Rev. J. J. Hall officiated.

Gen. Weaver one of the candidates for President of the United States is announced to speak in Raleigh September 20th.

It has been decided by the Oxford Democratic Club to send a large delegation to this city, on the occasion of the visit of Gen. Stevenson.

There was a joint meeting of several committees on the Centennial celebration at the Mayor's office yesterday afternoon, and some most important matters were mapped out.

Let everybody aid the ladies in their efforts to raise funds for the confederate monument. Remember the lawn party to be given in Nash Square next week, and work for it.

Mr. Geo. Fowler showed us today a species of spider of the most venomous looking kind. It measures about four inches from leg to leg and the body is as large as a man's thumb. Mr. Fowler captured it in his garden in the southern part of the city.

Big Shipment.

We copy the following from the State Chronicle of this morning: Mr. William G. Upchurch of this city is widely known as a breeder of fine cattle, his specialty being Jerseys. He has from time to time sold these in all parts of the country, from New York to Texas. His last sale has just been made, and it is the largest ever made in the State, being a car load of Jerseys, of all the 'Farmer's Glory' strain, a very fine one. The buyer is Mr. E. B. C. Hambley, of Rockwell, ten miles from Salisbury. Mr. Hambley is a very progressive man. He is an Englishman by birth, but came to this State some years ago and married a North Carolinian lady. He owns the largest dairy in the State and manufactures cheese and butter. He has invested \$75,000 in the dairy. Four Jersey bulls, as fine as any in the United States, head his herd. He will have 20 cows in his herd. Mr. Hambley is extensively interested in the breeding of trotting horses, and has large investments in banks, cotton mills and gold mines. He is doing a good work for the development of his adopted State.

The board of managers of the Raleigh Centennial have authorized the offer of a premium of twenty five dollars (open to the state) for the best poem appropriate to the celebration of the Centennial of the Capital of North Carolina.

Those who compete for said prize are requested to forward their papers (not to exceed fifty lines) to Thomas Badger, Esq., President Board of Managers, Raleigh, N. O. in sealed packages, marked "Centennial Poem" and signed with some name. Sealed envelopes containing the real signature of the writer and the name affixed to the poem should be sent on or before October 1st, next, and the award will be made by a competent committee duly appointed.

Harris, which will show the location of the 7,000 public schools as well as of all the private schools in the State. The white schools will be designated by a white cross and the colored schools by a black one. It is a splendid school reference.
