The insurance on the property lately burned at Caraleigh Mills has been adjusted.  
The cotton platform near the Raleigh and Gaston depot is being repaired.  
Mr. E. G. Birdsong left yesterday for Louisville Ky., to attend lectures on pharmacy at the college in that city.  
Large delegations from different towns in the State will be here on the 16th. The Oxford club will send a hundred delegates.

A meeting of the Board of Internal Improvement will be held in the Governor's office on the 6th, inst.

There being no quorum present, the meeting of the Board of Aldermen announced for last night was postponed until 12, o'clock today.

One of the most amusing features of the lawn party will be the minstrel show in charge of some of our humorous and attractive young gentlemen.

Henry Clay's visit to Raleigh was a grand occasion. All the old citizens yet speak of it as the event of the times. Let us equal it on the 16th.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad will take place on September 22th.

"Hang out your banners on the outer walls" and welcome our distinguished visitors on the 16th. Bunting is cheap and there should be a grand display of it.

It will be necessary to have the grass cut in Nash Square before the ladies' monument entertainment on Tuesday night. This should be looked after by all means.

Let every citizen help out the committee now soliciting subscriptions for the entertainment of our distinguished visitors on the 16th. The business men are especially interested.

All along the route from the city to St. Mary's grove on the 16th should be a perfect ovation. Let our distinguished visitors see that the capital of the Old North State knows how to treat strangers "within our gates."

## Confederate Relics &c.

Capt. Brooks earnestly requests all Confederates who have pieces of clothing which they wore during the war or other relics of those days of yore, to call on him at the sheriff's office by Monday at 11 a. m. as he wants them to be present at the "camp" on Tuesday night and wear such articles of clothing. He has succeeded in getting together a lot of pay rolls, confederate money, and a great many other relics of the war, which he will exhibit in a tent which will be a part of the Nash Square Confederate monument entertainment. The charge for entrance will be five cents.

## Club Meeting.

The meeting of the Cleveland Carr club last night took into earnest consideration the matter of the reception of Gen. Stevenson and others in this city on the 16th, inst. The report of the committee selecting St. Mary's grove as the place for speaking was adopted. The matter of transportation was fully discussed. The Jefferson button which is the badge of the National Association of Democratic clubs, was adopted. Three thousand badges with portraits of Cleveland and Stevenson were ordered for use on the 16th, the occasion of Gen. Stevenson's visit. A white cap, with the words "Cleveland and Stevenson" as its head gear, was adopted. Action looking to securing funds for the occasion was taken. The music committee was instructed to secure a band. A committee to select marshals was appointed. Forty six new members were elected to the club. Mr. Geo. Heck was given authority to name five delegates to the State Convention of clubs. Mr. T. P. Jerman was elected assistant secretary of the club.
