VACCINATION IN A NEW FIELD

M. Haffkine, a learned biologist of the Pasteur Institute, of Paris, declares that he has discovered a cholera vaccine the efficacy of which he claims to have tested both on guinea pigs and to a certain degree on human subjects. Mr. Haffkine and four other persons have been inoculated with the virus; and they now consider themselves proof against the scourge. The nature of the virus has not, of course, been disclosed, but its physiological effects are thus described:
 After the vaccination a feverish indisposition is felt, with headache and dryness of the mouth. That remains a day or two; but the local pain in the tissues remains a little longer. And, strange enough, the symptoms are like a light attack of influenza. It is not the first time that a connection between cholera and influenza has been noticed.

There is nothing essentially irrational or incredible in M. Haffkine's claim. Given the efficacy of the vaccination principle against one form of contagion, it would follow philosophically that the same principle should prove serviceable against other forms of contagious disease. It was on this theory that Pasteur himself wrought to combat the deadly disease of rabies; and in Germany some of the disciples of Koch have been experimenting to test the value of inoculation with certain elements in cholera cases. According to a New York newspaper, a lady of Berlin, the first cholera case in that city, has been cured by this mode of treatment.
 For these reasons, therefore, the Haffkine researches would seem to have been conducted along a promising line. But, warned by the experience of Koch's consumption cure, it might be well not to be oversanguine respecting new methods of cholera treatment, however distinguished the source whence they may emanate, until their efficacy shall have been so thoroughly demonstrated as to command the respect and confidence of the medical world.-Ex.
