**Skeleton Found.**

A city contemporary notes the finding of a skeleton on the grounds of the Agricultural and Mechanical College and supposes it to be that of one of the hands engaged in excavating for the North Carolina Railroad. Inasmuch as one of the one cent pieces found with it is dated 1854, we think the skeleton cannot be that as a railroad hand, as the cut for the railroad at that point was made before that date. An old citizen calls attention to the fact that Gen. John A. Logan had his headquarters on the site of the Agricultural and Mechanical College in April, 1865, and the skeleton found is doubtless that of some Federal soldier who was buried there at that time.

**A NOVEL CLOCK.**

A novel clock, made of colonial cedar, the case being forty feet high, will be sent to the World's Fair from Australia for the new South Wales Court. A group of figures, each twenty inches high, representing the federation convention, will be represented in the upper portion of the case and each one is to raise from his seat in turn and deliver a speech on the federation. Each hour a large organ will play a tune inside the clock, and the astronomical feats of this unique piece of mechanism will be admitted to the interior of the clock and the tower.—Woman's Journal

**THE CHOLERA FLEET.**

The number of quarantined vessels in the New York bay is being increased quite rapidly under the twenty day quarantine order. The incoming which had left foreign ports before the recent orders increasing the quarantine restrictions had been published are rather unavoidably caught, and naturally put to some inconvenience and delay, but it seems that there is very little kicking going on. A number of ships were ordered to join the quarantine fleet in the outer bay yesterday and day before. The Normania, with 500 cabin passengers and 500 stowage passengers were anchored at quarantine with such passengers as Senator McPherson and others of prominence. There are on the ship about 1,500 people, including passengers and crew, and to keep them cooped up together for a long time may bring on disease.

Mr E. C. Beddingfield, while making a Democratic speech in Franklin county a day or two since, was accused of having made Third party speeches by a bystander. The lie was passed and a fight ensued. Reports say that Beddingfield whipped his man and finished his speech.

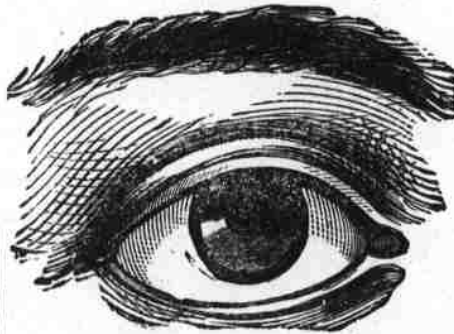
