CITY IN BRIEF.

Barbecue all the rage today. The Pythian Band today received the highest praise for proficiency. The newspaper press is well represented here today. The street cars are beautifully decorated. The city is alive with bunting and people. Welcome to our distinguished guests. A large number of pro people are in the city. The official fair programme this year will be published by Messrs. Edgar Broughton and Chas. Hurvey. The State Convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union is in session at Greensboro. It is deeply regretted that the death of a sister of Mrs. Thos. Holt has called the Governor away. The reception committee which went to meet Gen. Stevenson report a most delightful trip. The session of the Associated Clubs at Stronach's warehouse tonight will be very interesting. There will no doubt be a rousing attendance. One of the features of the reception of Gen Stevenson at Durham tonight will be a grand torch light procession. It is a striking coincidence that the grand jubilee in 1840, for Harrison and Tyler, took place near the site of the speaking today. The "Barnet" club from Swift Creek township headed by Col. L. D. Stephenson arrived in the city today. As they passed the Yarbore House they gave three cheers and proceeded up Fayetteville street amid great enthusiasm. They were all mounted. A telegram has been received announcing the death of Mr. Donald MacRae, Sr., of Wilmington. He was a director of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad and a highly beloved citizen. The speech of Gen. Stevenson at St. Mary's grove today occupied about two hours in delivery. It was listened to with marked attention by a vast assemblage. At its conclusion there was a general reception. Mr. Ewing, of Illinois, then delivered an address followed by other distinguished gentlemen.

There will be a grand demonstration at Chapel Hill tonight.

The forthcoming report of the Superintendent of Public Instruction will be a most interesting one: We gather from our contemporary the News and Observer the following:

The grand total of receipts for public school purposes for the year ending June 30th is \$775,439.63. The total expenditures for the same period are \$760,991.64

The census of the children of school age is, whites 396,560; colored 211,696; total 598,256

Out of this number were enrolled whites 315,919; colored 119,441; total 435,360

The average attendance was, whites 132,001; colored 66,545, total 198,547.

The average length of school terms was thirteen weeks.

The value of public school property is, whites \$636,525; colored \$255,839; total \$892,364.

The number of public schools taught was whites 4,603; colored 2,376, total 6,979.

The number of districts in the State was, whites 5,168; colored 2,387; total 7,555.
