Judge Bryan is fast disposing of the Superior Court docket.

Eight tennis grounds have been marked off inside the enclosure of Trinity College, at Durham.

There are now about a hundred students at the A. and M. College. The institution is fast gaining in popularity.

An important meeting of the board of managers of the Raleigh centennial took place this afternoon at the Mayor's office.

The trial of Mr. Wm. Lemon for bigamy it is understood, will take place at Burlington tomorrow. He will be confronted by Mrs. Lemon No. 1. but the second one in the program has made her exit.

Prof. Harrington, chief of the weather bureau is preparing a collection of weather proverbs for publication. It is desirable that any one who knows of any weather proverbs in use in North Carolina, should send them to Prof. O. F. Von Hermann of the weather bureau in this city.

We hear that Mr. Thos. Leslie, agent of Geo. Wilson Minstrels, who had his arm badly crushed recently by a locomotive in Florence, S. C., has undergone the process of amputation. At last accounts he was in a fair way to recovery although the chances seemed against him. He is a clever gentleman, and we sympathize with him in his affliction.

Although the cotton receipts have recently increased, owing, no doubt, to the small advance in prices, they are somewhat behind those for the corresponding week last year. Up to yesterday receipts for the week were 1,000 bales against 1,121 for the corresponding time last year. Up to date they are 2,815 against 2,748 for the same time last year, being a small increase for the season. If there is anything like a material advance in prices, it is expected the receipts will gradually run up.
