Capt. William Smith, Superintendent of the Raleigh & Gaston and the Raleigh & Augusta Railroads has informed Col. Heck, Chief Marshal of the centennial, that accommodations over his lines will be ample for the occasion. On the Raleigh & Gaston the passenger train which arrives at 9:45 a. m., will have coaches sufficient to accommodate one thousand persons and on the Raleigh & Augusta a train arrives at 9 a. m., to which will be attached coaches amply sufficient to accommodate all passengers coming to the centennial.
