The controversy between the United States and Great Britain in regard to the boundary between Alaska and British Columbia has been referred to a Commission consisting of two members, one appointed by each government. The meaning of the word "coast" in the original treaty between Great Britain and Russia is in dispute; and as both of the Commissioners are scientists there is likely to be a great deal of learned hair splitting before the matter has been definitely settled.

Some interesting results concerning the transplanting of oaks were mentioned in a recent paper read before the Edinburgh Botanical Society. A number of trees were transplanted at an early age, some later, and some left in the seed bed. Measurements of their girth, taken annually since 1890, show conclusively that the transplanted oaks are ahead at least fifty years of the others. Merely lifting the trees was also found to make them mature rapidly.

Here is another chance for the collectors of historical relics for the World's Fair. Slowly rotting away in a Union Pacific Railway yard at North Platte, Nebraska, is a tattered old car which in its early days enjoyed high distinction. It was built for President Lincoln in 1864; was used by him whenever he went to the front during the later military operations in Virginia, and finally it bore his body to his grave in Springfield, Illinois.
