Last night at Stronach's auditorium the board of managers assembled together with a large crowd of others. Dr. Skinner opened with prayer; Capt. Pogue introduced Capt. Denson who read the prize poem by Miss Minnie May Curtis, of Raleigh. Miss Alice Dugger sang "The Old North State" amid much enthusiasm, the accompaniment being performed by Miss Alice Jones. The centennial address was then delivered by Dr. K. P. Battle. It was an admirable and interesting resume of our city's history occupying about two hours in delivery.
