## CITY IN BRIEF.

Much colder weather is expected. The dust is pretty effectually laid. The condition of Mr. Jno. B. Neathery is much improved. Gov. Holt and party will probably reach home tomorrow or next day. How about a skating rink at Brookside Park. It looks like it might be a success. There is a perfect dearth of news at the different departments in the Capitol. We are pleased to see our young friend "Tom" Tate of Greensboro in the city. Raleigh and Gaston 8 per cent bonds are now quoted in the market at 130. Mr. R. H. Creech, a prosperous farmer and an esteemed citizen of Johnston county, died last Saturday. The revenue collections for the past week at Durham amounted to \$23,157.77. This is a heavy increase. A considerable number of drummers are putting in their appearance in this section. They generally report a brisk trade. It is stated that a large English syndicate is figuring for the establishment of a \$500,000 cotton mill in Rocky Mount. In addition to this, steps are on foot for a cigarette factory on an extended scale. Revivals are in progress at the Christian, First Baptist and Trinity churches in Durham. At the Christian church, the services are conducted by Rev. W. G. Clements, assisted by Rev. J. A. Jones and Rev. C. C. Peel. The Presbyterian Synod which met in Stateville last week has adjourned. Reports show 138 members in 3 churches, 5 licentiates, 7 candidates for the ministry and 27,845 communicants. The increase in funds collected over last year was \$11,000. There are still many dogs running at large in the city without the prescribed collar which means that no taxes are paid on them. This is a matter that should be attended to. Persons owning such should either comply with the law or dispose of them. An extension of the street car line to Pullen Park by next spring would be the correct idea. It would bring that resort into practical use and at the same time, we think be a source of revenue to the company. In this connection we would make the query whether or not the city should not help out in the premises. In view of the proposed extension of the corporate limits, we must think our City Fathers should take a hand in it.
