

Our Library.

There is no branch of our State Government that has undergone a change of more interest than that pertaining to the Supreme Court and State Library. Not many years since these departments occupied cramped and inconvenient quarters in the Capitol, and visitors were somewhat surprised at the meagre arrangement. Since the removal to the new building, the change has been almost magical. Now there are no larger or more convenient rooms for the purpose to be found in any of the States of the Union. This is specially true of the State Library, which has been transformed from a small apartment hard to reach into magnificent rooms where thousands of volumes of the best literature can at all times be seen and where a splendid gallery of portraits of many of North Carolina's most prominent citizens are hung for inspection. There is no better library now extant in this country, of course, excepting the Public Library at Washington City, and those in some of the largest cities in the Union.
