CITY IN BRIEF.

It is rumored that perhaps a colored fair will be held here during next month.

There are now fourteen inmates in the Odd Fellows Orphan Home near Goldsboro.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock from the residence.

Work has commenced on the extension of the Egypt rail way in Chat ham county, towards Randolph. It will probably go to Ashboro. It is understood that the Egypt coal company is doing a good business. Much of the coal is said to be used in this city.

The Atlantic Coast Line has issued a handsome new map of the New England, Middle, South Atlantic and Southern States, showing the route of its own line and all of its connections through those regions. It gives in detail all of the distances covered by the Atlantic coast line throughout the entire stretch of its 1,216 miles of track.

A real scrimmage took place at the little town of Princeton, Johnston county, on the North Carolina Railroad, yesterday, during the progress of a political meeting. Mr. John Raines and Mr. J. W.
