

Robberies.
It seems that most of the cities and towns in the state are the scenes of almost nightly outrages. In our vicinity there have, of late, been petty robberies, but we are glad to say that they have not reached any degree of magnitude. It may be well enough, however, for our people to keep on a sharp lookout. A few nights since, a gentleman residing in the vicinity of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, was aroused at night by a noise in the yard. Jumping up he seized a shot gun and fired in the direction of his poultry house, when the thieves took to their heels making directly for the Hillsboro road. These fellows know that the suburbs present a fine field, because they think it is without the scope of the police. Each being the case, we must advise persons so annoyed to prepare themselves with cold lead to receive such unwelcome visitors. Alluding to these depredations, the New Bern Journal says:

It seems that several North Carolina towns are now infested by organized bands of house breakers - burglary, which is a crime punishable with death, has become so common that almost any day a repetition of this flagrant crime can be noted. Raleigh, Burlington, Durham and Greensboro are all suffering from the depredations, and it has been but a few weeks since one of the burglars committed a murder in Burlington. Some of the robberies are committed with striking daring and it is remarkable that so few are caught. The systematic burglarizing has been going on for some time in Durham, but up to Monday the burglars successfully evaded every effort of the police to catch up with them, but there are now three suspicious negroes in jail there, who were taken while heavily armed with pistols, razors and brass knucks, and a hunt is being made for another negro named Henry Rogers who is known to have been concerned in some of the robberies. One has also been sent up in Wilmington to await the action of the criminal court.
