A BLOODY RIOT.

One Man Killed and Several Badly Wounded.

In an interview with Dr. Sanderlin this morning we learned that a bloody riot occurred at Burnsville, Yancy county, last Wednesday, resulting in the death of a notorious outlaw named Parrot, and the wounding of several persons.

It seems that on the day in question, Dr. Sanderlin was filling an appointment to speak in the court house at Burnsville. He was interrupted several times by a gang of mountain outlaws who had congregated for the apparent purpose of breaking up the meeting. They assailed Dr. Sanderlin with the most outrageous epithets but the Doctor persisted in making his speech, hurling defiance at his assailants. The confusion, became general when a crowd of the adherents from the outside attempted to make their way into the court house. They were met at the door and a desperate fight ensued with knives, pistols, bludgeons &c. The ring leader "Parrot" was wounded so badly that he died and many others both of the peaceable citizens and the outlaws were dangerously hurt. There is tremendous excitement in all the mountain country.

Narrow Escape.

This morning between 10 and 11 o'clock our fellow citizen Dr. Knox came near receiving quite a serious injury. He was driving up Fayetteville street in his top buggy when the axle broke causing the horse to start off rapidly. The doctor succeeded in jumping out and the animal ran against a tree at the corner of the Raleigh National Bank which stopped his flight. It was a near escape.
