This month was one of the best in the weather line on record. The mean temperature was 66 degrees, the highest 78 on the 1st, and the lowest 54 on the 26th. The mean temperature for this month for 14 years is 61 degrees. The past month was greatly deficient in rainfall, the total for the month being only twenty three one hundredths of an inch. In October, 1890 it was 4.89, and the record for October 1887 was 8.04. The average rainfall for October for 14 years is 3.84 inches.
