### CITY IN BRIEF.

Judge Connor was in the city yesterday.

The Superior Court adjourned yesterday afternoon.

The Board of County Commissioners will meet next Monday.

The change in the weather since yesterday has been quite sudden.

We were told today that the registration in this township is larger by about one half than ever before.

Mr. S. F. Telfair, the Governor's private secretary, has gone to Washington, Beaufort county to vote.

A highly enjoyable entertainment took place last night at Peace institute and a large crowd was in attendance.

Manager Huff of the street railway has removed his office to the power house on the corner of Jones and West streets.
