There is nothing since our last report to change the result in any material manner, so far as the election of President is concerned. The democratic plurality of the national and state tickets in North Carolina is estimated to be between 35,000 and 40,000, and the democrats will have a very large majority in both branches of the general assembly probably four fifths. In Wake county the returning board met at the court house at 12 o'clock today for the purpose of officially canvassing the returns, after which the result will be officially announced.
