**CITY IN BRIEF.**

The state canvassing board will meet December 3d.

The Supreme Court will reach the ninth district next week.

Mr. Thos. Pescud is quite sick at his residence on New Berne avenue.

Senator Vance will pass through Raleigh on his way to Washington next week.

A bunch of three small sized keys has been found and left at this office for identification.

A car load of unsteeped bales of cotton was destroyed by fire at Smithfield last night.

It is thought that Thanksgiving Day will be more generally observed than usual throughout the country.

Among the patents recently issued is one to J. A. & J. B. Wright, Rockingham, N. C., for an advertising device.

Several companies in the state have offered their services to Governor-elect Carr to act as his escort to this city.

Chief Justice Shepherd and Justice Burwell, the new appointees were sworn in today by Gov. Holt and have entered on the discharge of their duties.

The next thing in order will be the installation of our county officials which takes place on the first Monday in December.

Early in next month there will be a meeting of the line officers of the first regiment in this city to elect a colonel, lieutenant colonel and two majors.

We learn that it will be several days, hence, at least, before the proposed new arrangement of temporarily dispensing with the Street Conductors will commence.

The series of lectures at Trinity college for the season will commence on Tuesday the 23d inst. "The reign of the demagogue" by Hon. Temple Graves will be the subject.

The Hornet's Nest rifles of Charlotte have already secured two Pullman coaches for the transportation of that company to Washington on the occasion of the inaugural of President Cleveland.

The old residence on South Harrington street, near the cotton seed oil mill, is being renovated and put in repair. It will be used by conductors, engineers, &c., of the Richmond and Danville Railroad Company.

Quite an elaborate program is being arranged for the art exhibition at the Y. M. C. A. tomorrow (Thursday) night at 8 o'clock. The entertainment will be free to members, contributors and their lady friends. Some good music has been arranged and lots of fun may be expected.

An entertainment will be given at the residence of Capt. H. M. Faucette, corner Harrington and Lane streets, Friday evening, Nov. 18th, for the benefit of the orphan's home. There will be amusements, songs, recitations, games, refreshments, oysters, ice cream and candy. The public is cordially invited to attend.
