The students of the University at Chapel Hill have appointed ten delegates to attend the inauguration of President Cleveland. The representative from Raleigh is our young friend A. B. Andrews Jr.

All sorts of predictions as to who will get all sorts of offices. The only hope is to watch and wait. It is quite a long time till the 4th of March 1893, and even then the new President must have a little time to survey the field.

A large and appreciative crowd was in attendance at Peace Institute last evening and the exercises were highly enjoyed. The music was splendid and elicited frequent encores. At the conclusion of the entertainment a reception was held which was well attended.

Good music will be enjoyed at the Y. M. C. A. tomorrow at 4 o'clock. Mr. C. P. Wharton will be the special speaker. A song service of 15 minutes, led by Mr. T. C. Williams, Jr., will precede the address. Mr. A. H. Yerby will render a solo. All men invited.

It has been a long time ago since the street committee of the board of Aldermen were instructed to look after the extension of Morgan street. But the excitement of the campaign intervened. It's over now, and we are looking for speedy action. Shall "we call spirits from the vasty deep?"

Treasurer Bain's Successor.

This morning His Excellency Gov. Holt, issued a commission to S. McD. Tate, Esq., of Morganton, conferring upon him the appointment of Treasurer of North Carolina, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Donald W. Bain, Esq. The appointment of Mr. Tate, runs from the time of taking the oath of office and filling other requirements of law, and holds until the next election for members of the General Assembly, or, until his successor is chosen and qualified.

The selection of Mr. Tate for the high financial office of the State, was doubtless made after mature consideration and in furtherance of the best interests of the people of North Carolina. The gentleman selected has had the most ample experience in money affairs, both as a member of the finance committee of the General Assembly and as examiner under our National Banking system. His character for the strictest integrity is well known, and the administration of his high office will no doubt be such as to reflect credit alike upon himself and the State. He entered on his duties today.

Fair Or No Fair.

There seems to be somewhat of a hitch in the matter of the colored fair, and a dispute seems to have arisen about it between the Industrial Association and John H. Williamson, the secretary. The latter, however, is making preparations for the event and says it will open next week at the state fair grounds. Maurice Watts, of the executive committee declares Williamson is acting without authority. So it goes. We merely state the matter as we hear it, and hope it may be arranged to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Cotton Receipts.

The receipts in this city for the week ending Thursday afternoon last were 1,488 bales against 1,335 for the corresponding week last season. Since the 1st of September the aggregate receipts have been 12,435 against 12,99 last year.
