## IN MEMORIAM.

### Testimonial of Edenton Street M. E. Sunday School to State Treasurer Bain.

It is not often that we mourn as we are mourning now!

In the history of every person and church or other organization there is at some time a supreme grief which overshadows all other sorrows and in the darkening gloom of which every other loss or disappointment or affliction seems slight and trivial. Such is the supreme and overshadowing sorrow that has settled upon this Sunday school.

We have had frequent bereavements by which pious and devoted officers and teachers, and pure and promising pupils have been separated from their colleagues and collaborators by the hand of death, but these losses, while they left wounds and scars, did not drive the iron into our hearts as the death of our dearly beloved Bain has done. No one connected with this Sunday school can remember the time when our departed brother was not an important part of it if not its most devoted and zealous officer and member; and there are but few, if any, members of the church, lengthened though their lives be by borrowed years whose recollection of this Sunday school and its work does not bring vividly to their minds the gentle boy and gentle man who has just been laid to rest in our City of the Dead. His benevolent face and kindly manner, his gentle voice and cheerful greeting so familiar to every one who attends this school and church, are sadly missed today.

The history of this Sunday school, should it ever be written, would not be accurate or complete did it not tell, upon almost every page of some thing that Donald Bain said or did for its upbuilding and prosperity, and should its historian desire to depict upon his pages a model of piety, zeal and virtue, the life and character of Mr Bain would afford him at once and completely the materials for his work.

It is proper that, upon the death of such a man, so closely related as he was by a lifetime service in this Sunday school, we should give expressions to our sense of loss and place upon record our estimate of his worth; therefore.

Resolved, That in the death of our brother Donald W. Bain, assistant superintendent of the Edenton Street M. E. Sunday school, we have sustained a loss that is severe, grievous and irreparable—one that seems a personal loss to every one who, as an officer or teacher or pupil, has come within the influence of his gentle and Christian life and presence.

Resolved 2d. That in every relation of life—domestic, social, religious and political—Bro Bain was true, honest and faithful to every duty which that relation imposed upon him; pure in heart and life, assiduous in labor, diligent in business, zealous in Christian work, never forgetful of his allegiance to his Lord and Master, charitable to the poor, as kind and courteous to those in low station as to those in a higher sphere of life, honest, manly, clean-hearted and clean handed!

Resolved 3d. That a record be made of these resolutions, a copy be furnished the Raleigh Christian Advocate for publication, and a copy be sent to the family of our deceased brother with the assurance of our sincerest sympathy and condolence for and with them in their great bereavement.

The General Assembly will convene on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in January next, which will be on the 4th, day of the month.

Mr. Weston R. Gales, Assistant State Secretary, will address young men at the Young Men's Christian Association tonight at 8 o'clock, instead of Mr. L. A. Coulter who was unavoidably detained in the western part of the State. All young men are cordially invited. Good music and good singing.

In any event the institution in this city should remain.

The matter should also be submitted to those on the outside who are proposed to be taken in. Common consent in the matter would be much better, so that there would be no growling afterwards. We remember when the corporate limits were extended many years since it created a terrible "racket" among the "outsiders" and "insiders" and we almost had a young rebellion. We think it would be well to "count the noses" before hand. It may save a lot of bad blood. What say those who ought to know all about it. The Visitor will hear what you have to say about it.

### Rex Hospital.

We note that there will be a sale of valuable real estate by authority of trustees of Rex Hospital, to take place next month and, we argue from this that in all probability some steps are to be taken for the purpose of devoting the funds to the uses it was intended. We sincerely hope that all difficulties in the way, may be removed, and that a hospital of proper pretensions on an eligible site, may soon be an accomplished fact. It is an institution greatly needed in our midst. In fact it has become almost a necessity. Other cities in the state are moving in the matter and there should be no good reason why the capital should be laggard.
