The Contested Case.

The State Board of Carvers were engaged this morning in hearing argument of counsel as to the legality of the returns from Stokes county in the contested case of Messrs Settle and Williams for a seat in Congress. At the close of argument the board retired for consultation and on their return submitted propositions for further discussions. The board then adjourned until 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Invention.

The farmers in the vicinity, who have seen the model are much pleased with it, and it is thought he will make it a pecuniary success. Mr Parker is much encouraged at the prospect.

Swindlers.

All sorts of frauds are being committed now. An exchange says: A fellow called at a residence where he found an old lady alone. He offered to sell her a recipe for neuralgia for \$10. She declined to buy. He gradually came down to 30 cents, which was given him to get rid of him. The lady's son took the recipe to a druggist who examined it and found that the ingredients mentioned therein were rank poison. Such fakirs ought to be made to shake hands with an able bodied bull dog wherever they are found. They may not be in this part of the country, but it would be well to look out for them.

The State Farms.

It may be a matter of interest to know what the convicts from the state penitentiary are doing on the state farms. We gather from a reliable source that on the farm on the north side of the Roanoke there are about two thousand acres, and twenty-two hundred on the south side. From 500 acres in cotton they will get about 350 bales; from 1,500 acres in corn they will reap 9,000 barrels; from 150 acres in peanuts they will gather 6,000 bushels. From 150 acres of wheat they save 3,000 bushels. They made 1,100 gallons of sorghum and will kill 45,000 pounds of pork. On the Caledonia farm near Tillery, of 500 acres, they will get 370 bales and from 1,500 acres in peanuts they will gather 8,000 bushels. On the farms near Halifax there are three hundred convicts, many of whom are cleaning and ditching. On the whole the convicts are doing remarkably well.

Mr. C. G. Stone returned today from Wilmington where he took the three second prizes. He only went to race track four times for practice and only had a weeks notice. Mr. Cooper of Wilmington won the first prizes and has been in constant training over six weeks.

A dispatch today announces the death of the noted financier Mr. Jay Gould which took place at his residence in New York this morning at 9:15 o'clock. His death no doubt will cause considerable excitement in the money markets of the world

Owing to the intelligence of his wife's illness Rev. Sam Jones has cancelled his engagements and gone home.
