100 Blind Young Men.

A few weeks ago the Young Men's Christian Association of this city made complete arrangements for conducting a night school, under the direction of four of the best teachers in the state, and sent out invitations and made personal appeal to the young men of this city to come to the rooms three nights in each week and receive free of charge, instructions in English, mathematics, history, Latin, &c.

On the night set for the opening of the school less than a half a dozen reported. Another night was fixed upon and a fresh appeal made, and yet a class of one dozen could not be secured and the night school was abandoned.

We express great surprise, and the heading of this article speaks what we know to be true. There are certainly 100 young men in this city from 15 to 21 years of age, who are deprived of the opportunity of a day school, that might have availed them selves of this generous offer and unusual privilege of a night school. In this age of ignorance is a calamity and no young man can hope to be more than a usual laborer, who cannot keep up with the thought and progress of business and society generally.

Poverty may have been a barrier to many young men in the past but it is not so today. Men are measured by their character and brains now and without knowledge there can be no power.

We call attention to this matter with humiliation that our young men should have been so blind to their highest and best interest, with the hope that they see their mistake and that the proposed night school may yet be a great success.
