Report.

We have received the annual report of the mayor and officers of the City of Raleigh for the fiscal year ending February 29, 1891. It is a full showing of all the various departments of the municipal government. We specially call the attention of the board of aldermen to the following recommendation of the mayor, with the request that it be speedily heeded: "The sidewalks are not in as good condition as they should be; in fact some of them at times are almost impassable. Some systematic plan should be adopted by which they could be permanently improved. The interests of the city demand that something be done in this direction, and I am confident that at no distant date you will take this matter up and adopt a plan that will redound to your credit."

It is hoped by the ladies who have in charge the affairs of the Virginia Dare Memorial Association that the \$5,000 contributed for the state building will be allowed to remain in their hands for the erection of an industrial school for women in this state.

CIVIL CALENDAR.

W. C. Hardy trading as Hardy & Bros. vs Sallie E. Salisbury, as executrix of R. B. Salisbury; verdict in favor of plaintiff for \$4,436.28; judgment accordingly; judgment to be filed.

LIBEL CALENDAR.

United States vs 19 packages of distilled spirits containing 696 gallons and other property, seized as the property of James R. Rogers; verdict for United States; decree of condemnation to be filed.

EQUITY CALENDAR.

The State Trust Company of New York vs the Eastern Carolina Land, Lumber and Manufacturing Co.; order check in favor of the Phoenix National Bank of New York et al for \$500 filed.

The case of Mrs. Lois A. Crabtree vs the Old Dominion Steamship Co. for \$15,000 damages for injuries sustained by plaintiff while en route from Washington, N. C. to New Bern, N. C., on the company's steamboat "Manteco," is set for trial tomorrow.

County Affairs.

This morning a general transfer of matters took place so far as the county commissioners were concerned. Between 11 and 12 o'clock the old board met, but transacted only a little business before the newly elected board was sworn in. They consisted of the following gentlemen: W. C. Stronach, J. D. Allen, R. H. Jones, W. H. H. Jones and W. H. Hood. These gentlemen immediately went into regular session for the transaction of business. During the day the following official bonds were tendered:

Bonds of Sheriff Page, for collection of state and county taxes and discharge of the duties of his office, aggregating \$195,000. Bonds of Treasurer Lougee, \$23,000 for county funds and \$70,000 for school funds. Bond of Register of Deeds Mial, \$10,000. Bond of Clerk of Superior Court Thompson, \$10,000.

All of these bonds were first class with names of the most solid men in the county, thus showing that the standing of our officials is high. The bonds of the sheriff are really worth upwards of \$400,000, as also the bonds of the county treasurer.

Wake county may well be proud of such men to administer its official affairs.
