Acquitted.

After a short retirement the jury in the case of Zach Rhodes, charged with murder in Duplin county, yesterday rendered a verdict of not guilty. It seems that Rhodes was a deputy marshal and had a warrant for the arrest of a white man named Edwards. On making the attempt to arrest Edwards broke off and run. The deputy attempted to stop him but he kept running, with the evident intention to take refuge in a swamp. Rhodes finally fired upon Edwards from the effects of which he died. The judge's charge was strongly in favor of the prisoner.

Insane Asylum.

The regular meeting of the directors took place yesterday. Dr. McCormick was chosen temporary chairman, in the absence of Col. Amis, who was detained at home by sickness. Dr. Wood and the other officials submitted their reports, which were in all respects satisfactory. We are pleased to learn that the affairs of the institution are in frstrate shape. It was decided that the board would make application for a hospital in connection with the college so that there may be room for the reception of more patients. Of course the legislature should at once grant sufficient funds for the purpose. The unfortunates of the state should be amply cared for and not kept in the common jails or poor houses of the several counties, as is now necessarily done in many cases.
