The case of Mrs. L. A. Crabtree against the Old Dominion Steamship Company occupied the attention of the court today by argument of counsel.

The Baptist Convention.

The convention assembled this morning and proceeded to business. The most important features of the proceedings up to the adjournment for dinner was the discussion of the subject of missions which covered a broad field and was participated in by several distinguished gentlemen.

Most interesting remarks were delivered by Rev. Dr. Frost of Nashville Tenn., and a most elaborate argument was made by Rev. Dr. Tupper of Richmond Va., in favor of extending the fields of foreign missions. He said that more men and means were needed for the work, claiming that an addition of forty missionaries were wanted for labor in Mexico, South America and Italy and sixty more for China and other countries.

It is stated that Mrs M P Yates, of Shanghai, China, is expected to visit this state in the early spring of 1893.

Concerning the foreign mission board the report says:

We congratulate our foreign mission board upon the fact that the contributions to its work have doubled each decade since its organization in 1843.

Then, too, from May 1st, 1891, to Dec. 1st, 1891, the treasury of foreign mission board, Richmond, Virginia, received \$44,551.43; and between the same dates of this year he received \$53,819.56. This shows an increase in receipts in these seven months of this year over the same months of last year, for the regular work, of \$8,668.14.

While this is not all that might have been done, nor all we had hoped would have been done, yet when the conditions and influences with which the work has had to contend are fully understood, this increase is the most remarkable in the history of the board, and a cause of gratitude to God for his guiding hand and overruling providences for the furtherance of the gospel.
