Our Roads.

There is no subject that more really interests our people in the management of their local affairs than that pertaining to roads. In fact, in this fast and progressive age the country, state or community that is lacking in the way of good highways must necessarily suffer. In this connection we most heartily commend the action of the Chamber of Commerce at the recent session. While, of course, there is a natural tendency of our people against increased taxation, we must think that when it can be clearly seen such an additional levy will redound to public and individual good will be cheerfully acquiesced in. Mr. R. H. Battle's resolution is as follows, and was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, that it be recommended to the board of county commissioners to take steps as soon as possible to have a vote taken in the townships adjacent to Raleigh township, for the levying of a tax for the improvement of the public roads in said townships respectively in like manner as the public roads in Raleigh township have been improved. In addition to this, Mr. Battle offered a resolution which was adopted, in substance that the president of the chamber appoint a committee of five to memorialize the coming General Assembly to call together at the proper time and place a road congress for the purpose of improving the public roads of the state and matters pertaining thereto, the members of which congress to be appointed by the governor, mayors of towns, chairman of county commissioners and in such other ways as may be deemed most advisable.

We look upon this suggested movement, as one of the most important matters that has ever been brought to the attention of our people, in a business point of view. It is one so closely allied to our material interests that it should receive the earliest attention at the hands of legislators. The following committee was appointed to carry out the provisions of the resolution: H. B. Battle chairman, W. C. McMaekin, R. H. Lewis, Frank Stronach, W. P. Batchelor. That these gentlemen will do their whole duty in the premises goes without saying.

When the committee appointed at the recent meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, to consider the matter of applying to the legislature for a road congress, gets down to business, would it not be well to fully ventilate the subject of a road tax. It would be money well expended and pay better in the end than the old idea.

There are now 1,123 convicts attached to the penitentiary. Of these only 116 are in the prison, the balance being distributed on the various state farms and public improvements.
