Associated Press.
The directors of the Southern Associated Press have been in session in New York for several days past and all arrangements for a much improved service have been made. A contract has been entered into with the Western Union Company, and several additional southern papers have been given the privilege of entering the southern report. The Southern Associated Press will be the successors of the United, New York and Western Associated Press. The news reports will be much improved and every facility will be afforded to make it the best report ever sent South.

Important.
Two decisions of much importance have just been rendered by the Supreme Court of this state. In the case of an express company vs the Wilmington and Weldon railroad the court holds that the railroad contract is valid, but that it does not by its terms compel a railroad company to furnish facilities to every company desiring to run an express business over its line. In the case of Brown vs Telegraph company, the court holds that a telegraph company is liable for mistakes in transmitting a message, and that a stipulation on the blank forms on which the message is sent, exempting the company from such liability is null and void.

A Juvenile Band.

They hail from the colored orphan asylum at Pensacola, Florida and are traveling around giving concerts.
