The Hill Prizes.
It has heretofore been noticed that Dr. Chas. G. Hill, of Baltimore, a native of North Carolina, has given \$100 to be awarded in prizes for the best work done on the history of North Carolina. The conditions have been agreed upon as follows: The sum shall be divided into two parts of \$60 and \$40 and known as first and second prizes. The prizes shall be given for original work on any phase of the history of North Carolina. The theme chosen shall be subject to the approval of the professor of history in Trinity College. Competition shall be open to all members of the senior class in Trinity College, who have completed the historical work of three lower classes, or who have been passed on the same without conditions, and, until after June 1891, to no others. The award shall be made by a committee consisting of the professor of history in the college, the president of the college, and one other historical student chosen by these two and shall be amended at the annual commencement.

The 15th, 24th, 27th, 28th, 29th volumes of the North Carolina reports have been reprinted. This will be of great benefit to the profession as these volumes were out of print some years ago the state reprinted the 14th, 20th, 23d, 25th and 41st.

In making selections the voter retires to a room set apart for the purpose and makes a cross mark against such names as he desires to vote for.
