## CITY IN BRIEF.

Very little cotton coming in.  
The snow is fast getting away.  
Large number of strangers in the city.  
This looks like legislature weather sure enough.

Pork is selling high. It was held at 9¢ in market today.

There will be a large attendance at the Governor's reception tomorrow night.

Treasurer Tate is in favor of extending the compromise debt act for a reasonable time.

The Grand Lodge of Masons will meet in annual communication in this city next Tuesday.

There are now one hundred students in attendance at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Many of the candidates for office have left for their homes pondering over the ingratitude of republics.

It is estimated that 25 cents on each \$100 value of land in the state, less the sheriff's commissions, will yield \$575,819.

The Governor has appointed W. W. Baker, of Wilkes county, as solicitor of the 9th district to succeed Hon. Thos. Settle resigned.

There were the same number of deaths in December 1892 as in December 1891, and the same number in the 1st, and 2d, wards of Raleigh.

State Librarian Birdsong says there are 31,000 volumes in the library. The increase in number by purchase or gift, in 1892 was 1,500 volumes.

It is estimated that the governor's message contains between 28,000 and 29,000 words. It is an admirable document covering all points of state interest.

Quite a number of specimens for the Worlds Fair are in course of preparation at the Agricultural building. The fish and game of the state are well represented.

The Governor today pardoned Willis H. Brogden who was convicted and sentenced to six years imprisonment in the penitentiary for killing F. C. Sasser, in Wayne county.

Let there be a full representation of all the counties in the state at Road Congress on the 19th inst. It will be one of the most important assemblages, in many respects, that has ever taken place in North Carolina.

It is understood that the legislature will be asked to appropriate \$40,000 a year for two years towards the completion of the deaf and dumb asylum at Morganton. The amount appropriated two years ago was hardly sufficient to build the basement and ground floor. In this connection, we would suggest the enlargement of the institution in Raleigh, so that deaf mutes from the central and eastern part of the state may be retained in Raleigh. There is ample need for two institutions in the state—one east and the other west.

## A Gross Canard.

A dispatch was received here this morning announcing that the terrible riot in Mitchell county turns out to be a canard. We had an interview with the Senator from Mitchell today, and he informed us that he was well acquainted with nearly all the citizens of that county and that he knew of no such persons as those reported to have been killed. He said he thinks the whole affair is an outrageous fabrication.

## A Fraud.

A press dispatch last night gave the following account of a fraud practiced upon Rev. Dr. L. L. Nash, of Wilmington, former pastor of the Central M. E. Church of this city:

A stranger representing himself as Dr. W. H. Ellison of Washington city, and executor of the estate of Mrs. Eliza Wardlaw, called on the Rev. Dr. Nash, pastor of the Fifth Street Methodist church, last Monday and informed him that Mrs. Wardlaw had in her will left that church \$500, and he wished to draw a sight draft on Draxel & Co. of Philadelphia, in favor of Dr. Nash for that amount, which was done. He added that the costs in court when the will is probated would amount to \$6.15, in connection with the draft which amount Dr. Nash gave him. The stranger so captivated the pastor by his pleasant address and oily tongue that he was invited to supper at the personage where he entertained the family with stirring incidents of the late war. It has just transpired that the seductive stranger is a fraud and that he has been playing the same game at other points. There is no trace of him thus far.

In his annual report the inspector general recommends that the four regiments of the state guard be consolidated into three, and that encampments be hereafter by regiments at a different point each. This recommendation is concurred in by the quartermaster general.
