

**THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.**

**SENATE.**

January 5, 1893.

Called to order at 11 o'clock by President King.

Prayer by Rev. Dr. Marshall of Christ church.

Journal read and approved.

Chair announced following committees: On inauguration—Senators Posey, Mercer, Morton and Marsh.

Rules—King, Davis and Pou. The following bills was introduced: An appropriation for D. and D. Asylum at Morganton.

A memorial was presented by the Senator from Davidson signed by J. C. Newsom, setting forth his claims to the seat occupied by A. M. Stack, and asking that he be declared entitled to such seat. He charges that the certificate was improperly granted to said Stack.

A message was received from the House of Representatives announcing the organization and proposing committee wait on Governor. Senate took a recess for fifteen minutes. Senate resumed session. Invitation read from Governor inviting the members to a reception tomorrow night at the Executive mansion, between 8 and 11 o'clock.

Senator Cooper introduced resolution asking senators and representatives to use endeavors to secure repeal tax on state bank issues.

Bill introduced to incorporate Roanoke, Norfolk and Baltimore Navigation Co.

Bill introduced to establish a system of state banks with 4 percent bonds of North Carolina as a basis.

The Secretary of state was requested to furnish senators with laws and code.

**HOUSE**

Rev. M. T. Lawrence, a member, offered the opening prayer.

The rules of the last house were continued in effect.

Among the bills introduced the chief were: To incorporate the bank of Wayneville.

To incorporate the Western North Carolina and Tennessee railway.

To amend the constitution by reducing the homestead to \$500 and the personal property exemption to \$300.

At 12:30 the reading of Gov. Holt's excellent and voluminous message began. The reading occupied over two hours.

**Attorney General's Report.**

The Raleigh correspondent of the Wilmington Messenger gives an interesting synopsis of the report of the attorney general. Four volumes of the Supreme Court reports have appeared, embracing 620 cases, of which 117 were criminal actions, 78 of the latter being determined in favor of the state. He recommends the separation of the attorney general and Supreme Court reporter and that the salary of the latter be paid by fees against losing parties in all Supreme Court cases. He notes in the state an annual average decrease of criminal prosecution of 350 cases. He refers in plain terms to the great number of escapes of prisoners—91, and says these show gross negligence. One-fourth were in the Fifth district, where the evil is most rampant. He declares that the legislature will soon have to make provision for a revision of the statutory laws. Such revisions are necessary each ten years—the code is greatly amended, and scores of new laws are scattered through five large and unwieldy volumes of acts. The last revision was inconvenient, being in two volumes. He says a revision of the constitution is also necessary, by a commission, as the legislature does not have time to prepare it. He condemns antiquated the present plan of paying solicitors. He concludes his report by referring to the case of S. W. Sanders of Wilmington, in the matter of the act to protect seed buyers and of his discharge by a U. S. Judge. He says he is so much impressed with the conviction that the judgment is erroneous and the principles it announces so seriously impair the hitherto universally conceded right of the states to enact such inspection laws.
