Attorney Generals' Report.

The Raleigh correspondent of the Wilmington Messanger gives an interesting synopsis of the report of the attorney general. Four volumes of the Supreme Court reports have appeared, embracing 620 cases, of which 117 were criminal actions, 78 of the latter being deter mined in favor of the state. He re commends the separation of the attorney general and Supreme Court reporter and that the Salary of the latter be paid by fees against losing parties in all Supreme Court cases. He notes in the state an annual average decrease of criminal prosecution of 350 cases. He refers in plain terms to the great number of escapes of prisoners-91, and says these show gross negligence One-fourth were in the Fifth district, where the evil is most rampant He declares that the legislature will soon have to make provision for a revision of the statutory laws. Such revis ions are necessary each ten years the code is greatly amended, and stores of new laws are scattered through five large and unwieldy volume of acts. The last revision was inconvenient, being in two volumes. He says a revision of the constitution is also necessary, by a commission, as the legislature does not have time to prepare it. He con. demns as antiquated the present plan of paving so icitors. He concludes his report by referring to the case of 8 W. anders of Wilmington, in the matter of the "act to protest seed buvers " and of his discharge by a U. S Indge He says he is so much impresend with the conviction that the ju gment is erroneous and the principles it appronces so seriously impair the hitherto universally conceded right of the states to enact such inspection laws.


