Petty Cases.

The Charlotte News says: The commissioners of Mecklenburg county have petitioned our members of the Legislature to have a bill passed increasing the jurisdiction of the mayor of Charlotte. This is a wise move, and the bill should be passed. Hundreds of petty cases come before the mayor that eventually end in chain gang sentences, after an expense to the county of a term in jail and the added expense of criminal court costs. Had the mayor jurisdiction over these petty cases, as he should, send the offenders at once to the chain gang and save the county heavy costs.

We think the above would be applicable to Raleigh also. There are many cases brought before our mayor that might as well be finally disposed of by him, as to encounter the vast charges of a Superior Court trial. Such a law would, in our opinion, be productive of good results.

A Noted Swindler.

A few days since we gave an account of a swindler who had succeeded in imposing upon Rev. Dr. Nash, of Wilmington. It seems the fellow has been playing his game very extensively in different sections. The Wilmington Review has an interview with Dr. W. C. Ellison, of Washington City, who says:

"A few days ago a well dressed and gentlemanly stranger made his appearance in town and registered at the hotel. He was a man of fine address and apparently of wide information. He called upon the Rev. W. L. Mellichampe and stated that a wealthy lady of Washington City had recently died and given the Episcopal church at this place \$500, and he drew a check on the bank in Washington for that sum which he presented to Mr. Mellichampe. He went from here to Halifax and told a similar tale to the Rev. Father Price, only the gift there was to the Roman Catholic church and the sum \$500. He said his name was John Romaine and that the lady's name was Olligman. After drawing his check on the Bank of Ohio, Washington, for \$500 he walked around town looking at the public offices, jail &c. He said he held an office in one of the departments, was a democrat appointed by Mr. Cleveland but kept his office under the civil service reform rules. He applied to Mr. McMahon for a loan of \$50 saying he was in need of currency. This made that gentleman suspect the affable stranger, and he wrote to Father Price warning him of what he thought was a fraud. Father Price came here and learned what Romaine had done and on a visit to Petersburg he learned he had played the same game. It is also reported that he obtained \$50 in some such way from the convent at Staunton. He only succeeded in getting \$2 from Halifax. We have not learned how much he procured here."
