The Grand Treasurer especially recommended that the Ancient Warrant from England for the establishment of Masonry in North Carolina be carefully preserved as it was perhaps the oldest charter in this country.

On motion of P. M. Pearsall it was decided that the election of officers should take place at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday evening.

The report of the Superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum was read. This admirable report of Dr. Black will be noticed at length hereafter.

Reports of the Directors and Treasurer of the asylum were submitted and referred to committees.
