## CITY IN BRIEF.

Miss Bette Beets is quite sick at her father's residence on North Harrington street.

The sheriff of Edgecombe county settled his taxes with the state yesterday afternoon.

Large quantities of grain are in store at the experiment station ready for shipment to Chicago.

Mr. Will Wynne, of this city gave an exhibition of his skill on the bicycle in Greensboro last night.

Several northern gentlemen passed through the city yesterday on the way to Florida—smart people just at this time.

The attendance at the Agricultural and Mechanical college is daily increasing. There are now 115 students in attendance.

The speech of Mr. Walter Grimes in the house of Representatives relative to the inaugural appropriation is highly commended.

There are so many leaves of absence granted in the senate today that a senator said he hoped that a quorum might be left.
