For Jefferson Davis' Monument.

The Charlotte News says: E. D. Hall, major general of the United Confederate Veterans of this state, is in Raleigh on business connected with the Jefferson Davis monument fund. He is on the Executive Committee and is also State Senator M. O. Sherrill, Governor R. F. Holt and Senator Hanson, two other members, could not be present. Governor Holt is also interested in the plans for a \$19,000 appropriation to the soldiers home and for a \$5,000 appropriation for a monument to the North Carolina soldiers in the Confederate service.

Executive Committee.

The executive committee of the Board of Trustees of Wake Forest College met in the mission rooms of the Baptist State Convention last Saturday. The object of the meeting was to make provision for the work in the College, heretofore done by Rev. William Royall, D. D. LL. D. recently deceased, who was Professor of English in the College.

The committee arranged for this work to be efficiently done until the annual commencement in June 1893, at which time the Board of Trustees of the College will elect a professor to fill the chair of English.
