Railroad Troubles.

The Charlotte News says:
Pushing through snow banks is not the least of the difficulties encountered by railroad trains these days, and when one realizes the many obstacles that the engineers and trainmen have to overcome, it is no surprise that the trains are out of time. Ice and snow clog up the trucks and brake apparatus, the hot water pipes freeze, the rails are brittle and iron couplings are liable to snap at any moment. In spite of all these drawbacks, the trains would be able to make much better time except for one circumstance, more trifling in its nature, yet one that causes more delay than anything else. The water tanks all along the line are frozen. When an engine slows up to get a supply of water, the firemen and train hands have to go to work thawing out the tank hose, and then digging ice away from around it.

The superintendent of the Eastern asylum at Goldsboro states that for the last two years the institution has been so crowded that no patient could be received except when a vacancy occurred by discharge, and that there is imperative need for enlargement.
