## CITY IN BRIEF.

The merry sleigh bells are still heard.

Several theatrical companies are booked for February.

State Treasurer Tate is at his office again after a week of sickness.

It will take a warm rain of some duration to clean out the snow.

Eggs at 60 cents a dozen looks a little like old confederate times.

It is now thought that we will have no more "zero" weather during the present winter.

More country wagons made their appearance in market today, and than on any day for the past two weeks.

Several of the wells in the western suburbs have gone dry—an unusual occurrence at this season of the year.

The Egypt Railway Company has donated ten cords of wood to the poor of Raleigh, and will duplicate the number if desired.

Mr. E. W. Clements, of the N & W R R, son of Rev. W. G. Clements, had the misfortune to get his left shoulder dislocated last Friday.

An observing gentleman remarked today that there were persons of at least seven different nations doing business on South Wilmington street.

The entire plant of the Wilmington iron county works was destroyed by fire last Saturday morning. The loss is estimated at \$10,000 insurance \$7,500. The shops will be reconstructed at once with improved facilities.

Dr. Wm. J. Hawkins exhibited a very praiseworthy public spirit in having the snow cleared off the sidewalks in front of his entire property on Blount and North streets the next day after it fell, to the great comfort and relief of pedestrians in that direction. What a difference in the safety and comfort of those compelled to be out would have resulted from a general prevalence of such a spirit.

## The Kings' Daughters

The noble institution is doing noble work for the deserving poor of our city and vicinity. The directors of the mission rooms, however, request that the public will not recommend persons about whom they know nothing.

The following announcement is made:

It is the rule of the mission rooms that every case should be personally investigated, but during the excessively cold weather Mrs. Hayes has been compelled to rely in extreme cases upon the recommendation of persons whose names should be a guarantee that the families recommended are worthy and in need.

At the last meeting of the board of directors it was found necessary to pass a resolution that colored people should not be assisted from the mission rooms. They have all that they can possibly do to keep the white families that are in distress. All the colored people who have received provisions and wood during the past few days have been helped by the citizens, not by the King's Daughters. The King's Daughters wish to give work, not money. Only in cases of sickness and extreme need is food given. We again ask all who wish to help to leave at the mission rooms orders for mending, plain sewing, darning, scouring, etc.

Of course mistakes are sometimes made, but we beg that the public will aid in making the mission rooms a real benefit to the poor by helping them to help themselves. We heartily thank all those who have during the past week been so untiring in their efforts to aid us.

## Another Fire.

Yesterday morning at an early hour Winston was visited by another disastrous fire which consumed property valued at about \$100,000. Among the buildings destroyed were the Sneed furniture company and the Music Company's building. No place in the state has been visited with more extensive fires of late than Winston, and it looks like there must be a regular band of incendiaries there.

## Statement from the Citizen's Relief Committee.

At request of the citizen's relief committee this statement is made for the information of our people.

The committee met and organized Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock. As directed by the citizen's meeting the pastor of each church, of white and colored people, with Messrs. A. M. McPheeters, John D. Briggs, T. W. Blake, John T. Pullen, W. Z. Blake and N. B. Broughton were given authority to issue tickets to any family found in need—no ticket to be given until the condition of the family applying should be personally inspected.

A supply store was opened at corner of Morgan and Blount streets and Mr. W. W. Parish placed in charge of same.

At a meeting of the committee this morning a full report was made of the work done on Friday and Saturday. The treasurer, Mr. John T. Pullen, reported that he had received \$1,800 in cash. Mr. Parrish reported that 639 orders for provisions had been filled with an expenditure of \$359.

A careful investigation made and it was discovered that 80 of the orders issued were improper. Rev. Dr. Daniels introduced the following which was adopted:

Resolved That the detailed report of the committee of distribution be accepted as satisfactory; that in view of the numerous applications the committee is congratulated that the cases of irregularity should be comparatively so few, and that the same committee be continued.

N. B. Broughton, who had served the committee as chairman, stated that his private business demanded so much of his time that he could not longer serve as chairman and do justice to the position. He offered his resignation, which was accepted, and the thanks of the committee tendered him for the efficient service he had rendered.

Hon. Alf A. Thompson was unanimously requested to take the chairmanship of the committee and kindly consented to do so.

The committee desires to assure the public that they realize the sacredness of the trust committed to them and will thankfully receive any aid given in reporting cases of destitution, or exposing unworthy applicants.
