At her home at the Institution of Deaf Dumb and Blind yesterday evening at 4:30 o'clock, Mrs. Nellie Young, wife of W. J. Young, Esq. Principal of the Institution. She had been sick only a few days, and was not thought to be seriously ill until two or three days ago. Mrs. Young was one of the most accomplished and useful ladies in the city, and will be greatly missed by the children of the Edenton Street Methodist church Sunday school, she having been for many years in charge of the infant department of that school. She was an accomplished musician, and a woman of gentle and lovely disposition. Altogether, she was one of the noblest and best women of this city, and she will be mourned among us.

The funeral will take place at Edenton Street church tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock p. m.
