

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

January 30, 1893.

Speaker Overman called the house to order and Rev. J. B. Harley prayed. A notice of contest of the seat of George H. Bellamy by Isham W. Harrelson was served from Brunswick county.

Among the bills introduced were the following:

To give 20 more counties until May 1 to settle their state taxes

To allow sheriffs to levy on personal property of those who owe taxes and are about to remove from the State.

To make the first Monday in August the date of sale of lands on which taxes unpaid.

To extend for 12 months the time for the redemption of lands sold for taxes.

To appropriate \$1,000 yearly for the A. & M. college and \$4250 yearly for equipment, and giving it 100 acres of the camp Mangum lands.

To discourage lynching, by holding a court over and terminer in 30 days after a lynching and by hanging convicted lynchers in 3 days.

To require railways to employ train operators over 18 years of age, with 2 years experience and a certificate of proficiency.

To require tax listers to list solvent credits, doubtful and insolvent credits.

Bills passed to provide uniform rule for damage suits against railways for the use and occupation of lands.

To incorporate the bank of Waynesville.

To exempt the bonds of Fifth St. M. E. Church of Wilmington.
