The North Carolina Commercial and Industrial Association recently held a meeting in this city, and a committee was appointed to formulate and recommend to the legislature such amendments to the insurance laws as might be proper. This committee will meet in the Commercial and Farmers' Bank February 7th. The following constitute the committee: Col. R. M. Douglas, J. E. Gilmer, W. S. Parker, Judge Fred Phillips, F. Klutz, Capt. J. J. Thomas, Wm. Boylan.

## The Carnival.

Last night was a most enjoyable occasion at the skating rink. There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen and everything passed off in the happiest style. The fantastic costumes gave a most delightful charm to the surroundings. Among the experts may be mentioned Mr. John J. Whitehead, Arthur Nowell, Melville Andrews, C. B. Edwards, Jr., and Thomas Nowell. There were also several lady skaters who performed admirably.

## Relief Committee.

Our energetic fellow citizen, Mr. Alf A. Thompson, chairman of the relief committee, has submitted a report showing that the number of orders supplied by committee was 1,156 for provisions and 600 for wood, making a total of 1,756. Estimating each family at four persons the committee furnished food for 4,634 and wood for 2,400 besides a contribution of \$50 to Oberlin, and paying \$77 to laborers on the streets. On the 23rd inst. the residents of Oberlin held a mass meeting and adopted resolutions thanking the people of Raleigh for their aid. On the 26th, the colored citizen of Raleigh adopted similar resolutions.

## The Confederate Monument.

Senator Day yesterday introduced a bill in the senate looking to the erection in Nash Square of a monument to the statesmen soldiers and sailors of the four great wars of the country. The resolution anticipates the appointment of a commission who shall take the matter of contract into consideration and report to the General Assembly. While we heartily commend the purposes of the resolution, we had hoped for measures which would sooner consummate the matter.

The following is the resolution: "RESOLVED by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring, That there shall be erected on Nash Square, in the city of Raleigh, a suitable monument, worthy of the State, as a memorial to the statesmen, soldiers and sailors who, during four great wars have upheld the honor and fame of the sovereign State of North Carolina. That Walter Clark, Jacob Battle and Marion H. Holt are hereby appointed a committee who shall procure plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of such monument, and report the same with their recommendations to the next General Assembly. That such plans shall provide for a central equestrian statue, and at the base ten pedestals to be filled hereafter with statues of ten distinguished statesmen, soldiers and sailors of this State, four of which shall be allotted to heroes distinguished in the war of the revolution two to the war with Mexico and four to the late civil war.

The other resolution provides for the cost etc.

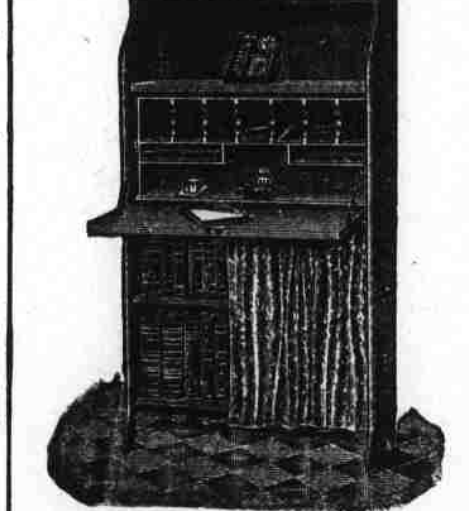
