## DEATH OF JAMES MCKIMMON.

It is with the deepest regret that we announce the death of the above named gentleman which occurred last night about 9 o'clock, at his residence, on north Blount street.

Although the health of Mr. McKimmon has been for some time past in a precarious condition, his death was somewhat sudden. He was in the 53rd year of his age and justly considered one of our best citizens.

He graduated at Chapel Hill and served throughout the war in Manley's battery.

At the close of the war he engaged in the business of a commercial trader for a large drug establishment, but afterwards became proprietor of a drug establishment in this city, which he was engaged in conducting at the time he was taken sick.

In all relations of life Mr. McKimmon was a true hearted, noble gentleman.

He had in all respects the courage of his convictions, which he boldly asserted, but in a manner not to offend those who differed with him.

It can be said that he was generous almost to his detriment, and no object of charity met his view without a kind response.

He leaves a wife, three children, brother, two sisters and other relatives to mourn their loss, with whom, in common with our community at large, we most deeply sympathize.
