CITY IN BRIEF.

Soon be Lent.

The "Mascot" is all the talk.

Col. Wm. Johnson, of Charlotte, is here.

Ex-Mayor King, of Greensboro, is in the city.

Senators Day, Posey, Jones and Olive brought down the house last night, and delighted the galleries.

Capt D. G. Conn has been hurriedly called to Winston by the death of his sister, Miss Sallie W. Conn.

Through trains will be put on between Raleigh and Richmond, via Durham commencing next Sunday.

The sale of seats for Robt Downing Tuesday evening will open at Mac Rae's drugstore Friday morning at 8 o'clock.

The bill for the formation of the new county of Scotland will be the special order in the Senate tonight at 8 o'clock.

Some of the states have passed strong prohibitory laws against the use of cigarettes. North Carolina passed one some years ago forbidding the sale to minors, but it seems to have no effect. In fact most of those smoking the things are boys from two to eight. It's not so much the fault of the merchants, as boys get them through old persons who buy for them.
